## THE PEACE PRIZE FESTIVAL

The 1997 Peace Prize Festival is an afternoon-long celebration of peace through music, dance, demonstrations of artwork, stage performances, and presentations from Nobel Peace Prize laureates, the Norwegian Nobel Committee and other distinguished guests.

Along with displays and exhibits from artists, peace-oriented organizations and educational institutions, the Festival students from Peace Site schools and other youth groups, in the Festival's own Adopt-A-Laureate Program, will use storytelling, skits and music to demonstrate what they have learned about their adopted laureate. The afternoon's program ends with music and a celebration of the Nobel Peace Prize. It is open to the public.

The Peace Prize Festival is held each year in cooperation with the Peace Prize Forum and the Norwegian Nobel Institute. The Peace Prize Festival is for youth and the general public who are not able to attend the Peace Prize Forum which is held annually on a college campus outside the metropolitan area. Nobel Peace Prize laureates speaking at the college Peace Prize Forum are invited to address the Peace Prize Festival.



## THE PEACE PRIZE FORUM

The ninth annual Peace Prize Forum will be held this year on March 7-8, 1997 at Augustana College, Sioux Falls, South Dakota. The theme is 'Striving for Peace: Science & Ethics In International Affairs.' Speakers include 1995 Nobel Peace Prize laureates Professor Joseph Rotblat and Professor Francis Calagero, Chair, The Pugwash Conferences, winners for their work to prevent nuclear war. Also speaking: Betty Reardon, Director of Peace Education, Columbia University, and Terry Waite, author/humanitarian.

The Peace Prize Forums, first held in 1989, are organized in cooperation with the Norwegian Nobel Institute and hosted on a rotating basis by five colleges of Norwegian heritage: Augsburg (Minneapolis, Minn.); Augustana (Sioux Falls, S.D.); Concordia (Moorhead, Minn.); Luther (Decorah, Iowa); and St. Olaf (Northfield, Minn.). The two-day event offers Nobel Peace Prize laureates, diplomats, scholars, students and the general public a chance to examine the root causes and manifestations of conflict and the challenges of peacemaking, while promoting the work of the Norwegian Nobel Institute and Nobel Peace Prize as potent instruments of peace.
